

Luellen Curry has taught at Wake Forest University School of Law since 1989. She is currently an Associate Professor of Legal Analysis, Writing and Research, and also teaches a seminar on Race and the Law. Prof. Curry is a two-time recipient of the Black Law Students Association Teacher Appreciation Award.

In practice, Prof. Curry was a Staff Attorney with the Legal Aid Society of Northwest North Carolina, and a Reginald Heber Smith Community Lawyer Fellow. She has expressed her commitment to community service through her work with a variety of organizations. Currently she serves on the Boards of Mediation Services of Forsyth County, Disability Advocates of Northwest NC, and Legal Aid of NC-Winston Salem. She is a past President of the North Carolina Association of Women Attorneys and former Chairperson of the East Winston Community Development Corporation.

Perhaps Prof. Curry's greatest impact in community service has come from her work with the North Carolina Black Repertory Company. She served as a member of its Board of Directors from 1984-2011, and was Treasurer from 1994-2011. She has also worked with the Theatre Company's international outreach program, the National Black Theatre Festival[®], since its inception in 1989 as both a volunteer and a staff person. As a volunteer, she has served as one of two Volunteer Co-Coordinators for the biennial event, which typically draws over 60,000 people to Winston-Salem for a week of professional Black Theatre and related activities. As staff, she has had a variety of responsibilities, from managing the office to revising and editing printed materials.

Prof. Curry's years of service to the Theatre Company and the Festival have not gone unnoticed. In 2009 she was presented with the National Black Theatre Festival[®] 20th Anniversary Appreciation Award, and in March, 2011 the Winston-Salem Chronicle chose her to be one of three recipients of its Curator of the Arts Award.

Prof. Curry grew up in Lexington, NC and graduated from Oberlin College in Ohio and Northwestern University School of Law in Chicago. She is a member of Dellabrook Presbyterian Church, where she has served as a Deacon. She and her husband, Rev. Dr. Carlton A.G. Eversley, have two adult children.
