Topic: Measuring the Context of Healing: Development and Validation of Healing Encounters and Attitudes Lists (HEAL)

Nonspecific or context factors, such as treatment expectations and views of the patient-provider relationship, may play an important role in treatment outcomes. Such factors also may be important components of the placebo response. However, such factors are rarely measured in research and clinical settings. Our team has developed a set of patient-reported questionnaires, entitled the Healing Encounters and Attitudes Lists (HEAL), that are concise, precise, and appropriate for use with many types of treatments and nearly any clinical condition. In this presentation, Dr. Greco will describe basic procedures used to create the HEAL questionnaires and will provide evidence for the HEAL questionnaires' validity for predicting improvement following integrative and conventional treatments.

Complementary and Integrative Approaches for Cancer Symptoms and Treatment Side Effects

Many people who have been diagnosed with cancer use complementary health approaches. According to the 2007 National Health Interview Survey (NHIS), which included a comprehensive survey on the use of complementary health approaches by Americans, 65 percent of respondents who had ever been diagnosed with cancer had used complementary approaches. Those who had been diagnosed with cancer were more



likely than others to have used complementary approaches for general wellness, immune enhancement, and pain management.

A substantial amount of evidence suggests that some complementary health approaches, such as acupuncture, massage therapy, mindfulness-based stress reduction, and yoga may help to manage some cancer symptoms and side effects of treatment. For other complementary approaches (e.g., natural products), the evidence is more limited. Stress and Relaxation Techniques from NCCIH

Relaxation techniques may be helpful in managing a variety of health conditions, including anxiety associated with illnesses or medical procedures, insomnia, labor pain, chemotherapyinduced nausea, and

temporomandibular joint dysfunction. For some of these conditions, relaxation

techniques are used as an adjunct to other forms of treatment. Relaxation techniques have also been studied for other conditions, but either they haven't been shown to be useful, research results have been inconsistent, or the evidence is limited.
